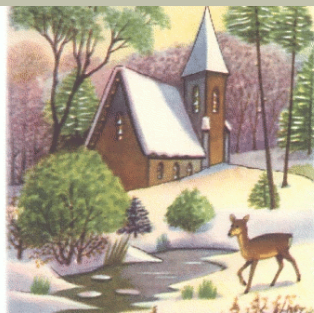

THE SPIRIT OF GENEROSITY

Two thousand years ago a phenomenal event took place that would change the world. The angel Gabriel appeared to a virgin named Mary living in Nazareth, a town in Galilee, and said to her: "Greetings, you who are highly favored! The Lord is with you."...Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favor with God. You will be with child and give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus." (Luke 1:28-31)



Mary believed the angel and nine months later she bore a son and named Him Jesus, as she was told. Wise men from the east went to Bethlehem where Jesus was born in a manger to celebrate His birth, bringing with them gifts of gold, incense, and myrrh, gifts that symbolized His kingly authority and the redemptive purpose of His birth.

The apostle John, in his gospel, states clearly the reason for the birth of Jesus Christ: "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16). Similarly, the apostle Paul captures the essence of Jesus's ministry with these words, "But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us". (Romans 5:8)

These two verses inform us that Jesus Christ is God's love gift to the world for the redemption of man, that God so loved us that he offered His only Son as a ransom for our sins in order to reunite us with Him forever. What greater gift can we desire? And how can we say thanks to God during this Christmas season for His generous gift to us?

The best way to express your love to God is to show love to someone else, especially the less fortunate. There are many needy families living among you: they live in homes without heat; they live in cars and vans parked in inconspicuous places; they live in

make-shift tents and sleeping bags in alleys and less travelled streets; some live in shelters and other public places; others live unnoticed in your neighborhood.

A great opportunity awaits you this Christmas to show love to the needy people living among you. Let the spirit of generosity come alive in your heart today and take the initial steps to bring joy to someone in desperate need of your help. In addition or in lieu of sharing gifts with those you love, plan to give a gift to a family in need or to a homeless stranger.

In this edition of CAT~news, the focus is on the theme, *The Spirit of Generosity*, most appropriate for the Christmas season. In the next few pages, you will read stories from different schools about their generous acts of love for needy families in their community and abroad. As you read, may the spirit of generosity compel you to spread God's love by giving generous gifts this Christmas to the broken and the less fortunate people living among you.

THE WAYS WAES GIVES

Windsor Adventist Elementary School, Windsor, ON

The Windsor Adventist Elementary School has been involved in a Fall Food Drive for many years and this year was no exception. Sixteen students bundled up and



distributed paper bags for households to fill with canned and non-perishable items. A week later, on October 24th, 2012, those same students from grades 5 through 8 revisited those homes and picked up those paper bags and more, filled with food, clothing, and toys for the church's Community Services Food Bank which services the immediate community. This year, we were able to collect approximately 500 food items and several bags of clothes and toys.

Also, in conjunction with our very vibrant Windsor SDA Church Community Services Department, the WAES students assisted in the annual Coats for Kids winter coat give away. Students helped haul boxes and bags full of winter coats for the program where people from the community come into the church prior to the frigid weather to pick up a free winter coat.

In addition to this, each year the students and families of WAES pull together donating canned goods to make the Christmas season brighter for a couple of needy families in the community. We are currently collecting for these families with plans to deliver boxes to them just before we leave for Christmas break.

These are some of the things we've done since the beginning of the school year. In the next several months, we plan to continue serving the community by giving of our time, efforts, and generosity.

PARKVIEW ADVENTIST ACADEMY, LACOMBE, AB

Generosity can be difficult to teach a young child as humans are naturally selfish. But somewhere many parents did a fantastic job teaching how to give to their children because this year at Parkview Adventist Academy the students are amazing their teachers with their spirit of giving. Taylor Lakusta Wong recently visited the First Nations Church in Hobbema and was impressed to try and make a difference there. She came back to school and approached the staff about setting out a box to collect coats and mittens for the students at Mamawi Atosketan Native School. The box that was chosen is three feet by six feet and at least three feet tall. It is almost full now from the students and staff donating

warm woollies for kids who show up at school without any.

Another student-led movement has been by the senior boys. A classmate, Jessie Ganson, was diagnosed with a brain tumor last spring and had to undergo surgery. He has been in and out of the hospital while undergoing cancer treatment. The guys on their own accord declared November as not just November but No Shave November and they got several of the male staff to join them. They collected sponsors and donors for their cause. Their goal is to reach \$5000. They have reached a little over \$1000 to date, and even though November

is over, they are collecting bottles and cans to earn the rest. The money will go to the family to help alleviate expenses that accrue from such an experience.

The staff at Parkview Adventist Academy are very proud of our students!. For teenagers to see a need in someone else and fill it is a wonderful thing. They are truly learning the meaning of being a Christian.

So, you've spent some time working with your class developing podcast episodes that you would like to share with others in your school community or even around the world. iTunes is one of the easiest ways.

An Introduction to Skype

Skype is a phone service that allows users to make computer-to-computer phone calls to anyone in the world absolutely free, using your Internet connection. You can use it to collaborate and make global connections with family, classes and professional peers using something we are all very familiar with – a phone call.

Recording Skype Interviews

Record Skype class conversations that you have with visitors or leading experts and upload them to a class website, blog or podcast series. Expand the boundaries of learning in your classroom.

Real-Time Assessment with Poll Everywhere

Use a mobile phone's text messaging capability or a simple web form to capture an audience's thoughts and understandings at a given moment in time. Great for instant polling in a classroom!

Making Learning Visible with Screencasting

Screencasting is a quick and easy-to-use idea that can help you create slick demonstration tutorials in any subject area, using any computer application. The software allows you to record a movie of what you are doing on a computer. Along with your movie, you can record voice-over audio to provide a series of instructions.

Each one is so intricate and small because Christ sees the details of us all, and just as two are never the same the Lord knows and calls us each by name.

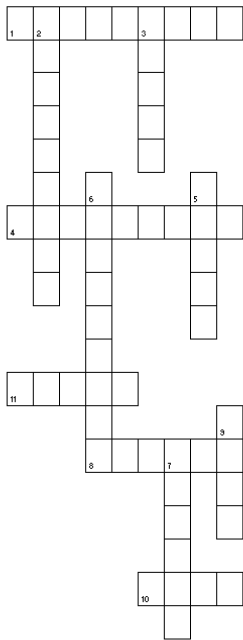
Snowflakes gently cover the world in white and hide what's unlovely from our sight, showing us how He covers our sin and gives us His grace when we come to Him.

MAKE A PAPER SNOWFLAKE OR A SNOWFLAKE CARD

Make simple snowflakes from paper. You can tape these snowflakes to a window for a nice winter decoration or paste them onto a piece of folded construction paper for a great Christmas card.



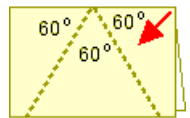
Supplies Needed:

White Paper

- Scissors
- Optional: A protractor
- Optional: Glitter or glitter glue
- For a card: A piece of coloured construction paper and glue

Directions:

1. Fold a piece of paper in half.
2. Fold over one side, then the other, to make two 60 degree folds. You can do this by eye, or you can use a protractor. This is a good exercise in geometry for measuring angles.
3. Cut off the edges of the paper in an arc - this makes a circle (if you were to unfold the paper).
4. Cut a lot of the paper away.
5. Unfold your snowflake carefully.
6. Glue your snowflake onto a folded piece of construction paper for a great Christmas card.
